Abernethy Elementary School Grows Champions and Fosters the Love of Reading

This spring Abernethy Elementary School sent their school's winning Oregon Battle of the Books team, The Reading Rascals, to the state championship after they bested 19 other school teams. What is OBOB? It's a statewide reading and comprehension program sponsored by the Oregon Association of School Libraries, run primarily by volunteers. In its simplest terms, teams of kids read the same books and then compete against each other answering questions about the books' plots.

The Reading Rascals is a special team, first coming together during the pandemic when the kids were in 3rd grade and first eligible to participate. School was remote and team meetings happened via Zoom. But there was no denying their connection - a love of both books and competition. So Celia Sternberg-Darin, Mason Koehler, Mikaiah Shakya, Sully Harris, and Warren Nguyen Carroll have stuck together on this team for the past 3 years and graduate from Abernethy in June. After winning the school title in February, they went on to win the regional title in March by beating out 23 other local teams in a grueling 6 hour tournament, qualifying them for state. Richmond Elementary came in second. While the Reading Rascals did not win the state title in April, they certainly walked away proudly with one heck of an experience.

"I'm not sure most people understand how much work it is to be as good as [this] team is this year. Or the elite puzzle solving skills involved in being that good." Alex Bassos said of the Rascals. Alex volunteer-moderated at both the school and regional competition this year. More significantly, he coached last year's Abernethy team (The Thunderbolts) that won regionals in 2022.

So what gives? What's the secret sauce for this little school under the elms? Teachers who prioritize literacy? Yes. Parent and community support? For sure. But at its core is an incredible school librarian: Quinn Sanford. Her love of books is contagious. Her dedication to her students is undeniable. Victories like these are only possible because of her long term commitment and the program she built. At a time when school funding is on everyone's minds, the Reading Rascals' success is a reminder of the important role that school librarians play in our community.

Richmond Spring Cleanup Breaks Last Year's Record

The Richmond Spring Cleanup, held on May 20 at Central Christian Church, was a huge success this year. We had 295 vehicles pass through the Cleanup, over 100 more than last year's record number of vehicles. This was possible by having twice as many volunteers as last year, with 78 people helping to put on this event, including 11 students from Central Catholic High School.

We collected 50% more bulky waste than last year, at 12.57 tons. The recycling numbers were just as impressive: 40% more metal was recycled that last year and we took a large truckload of block Styrofoam to Agylix for recycling. We also took 3 pickup truckloads of household items to Community Warehouse to be distributed to families and individuals in need.

CNBSeen.org set up a vehicle tail light bulb repair station again this year. Their mission is to prevent pretext stops by the police by replacing burnt or broken tail lights. Almost 4x the number of vehicles used that service compared to last year.

We also started this year a new Seniors and Disabled pickup service where a 2-person crew picked up bulky waste, furniture, recyclable material, and reusable items from those who are not able to bring items to the church.

Our U-Price-It Rummage Sale and Plant Sale grows every year, with the proceeds going toward the RNA's community events, such as the free summer movie in Sewallcrest Park.

The day before, on May 19, we provided a dumpster for the residents of Peaceful Villa, the low-income housing complex operated by Home Forward at SE 47th and Clinton. Combined with that event was a Metro Household Hazardous Waste event, where expired medications (82 lbs), batteries (403 lbs), compact fluorescent bulbs (77 lbs) and sharps (64 lbs) were collected.

This annual community event is greatly assisted by the sponsorship we get from Metro's Regional Refresh Fund and fiscal sponsorship by SE Uplift. The many generous businesses who donate for this event are: Fred Meyer Hawthorne, New Seasons Hawthorne store, Safeway Starbucks on Hawthorne, St. Honoré Boulangerie Division store, Petite Provence Division Store, Portland Nursery, Voodoo Donuts, Salt & Straw Division store, and Rovente Pizza Hawthorne who gives us a great discount for the pizza that feeds the volunteers.

We are already starting to plan next year's Cleanup on Saturday May 18 (always the Saturday after Mother's Day) – mark your calendars. If you want to join in and volunteer for next year's event, contact richmoncleanup@gmail.com.

- SHARPS & EPI-PENS: Sharps containers will be available for free, while supplies last.
